1. Call to Order/Welcome. The meeting was convened by Steven Williams and committee members introduced themselves, both virtually (Theresa Burke, Aurelia Smoltsteig, Jennifer Griffin) and in-person (Lisa Dick, Sharon Whitley, Phil Huang, Steven Williams). A quorum was present.

2. June 11, 2025, Meeting Minutes. The minutes were approved as drafted.

3. Public Health Provider - Charity Care Program Update.

Kaleb Miller presented updates on the Public Health Provider Charity Care Program (PHP CCP). Key reporting periods were outlined for future federal fiscal years (FFY2025–2026) but the handouts were not available.



Cost report trainings are mandatory for both new and returning providers to maintain program eligibility; dates shared for upcoming trainings.

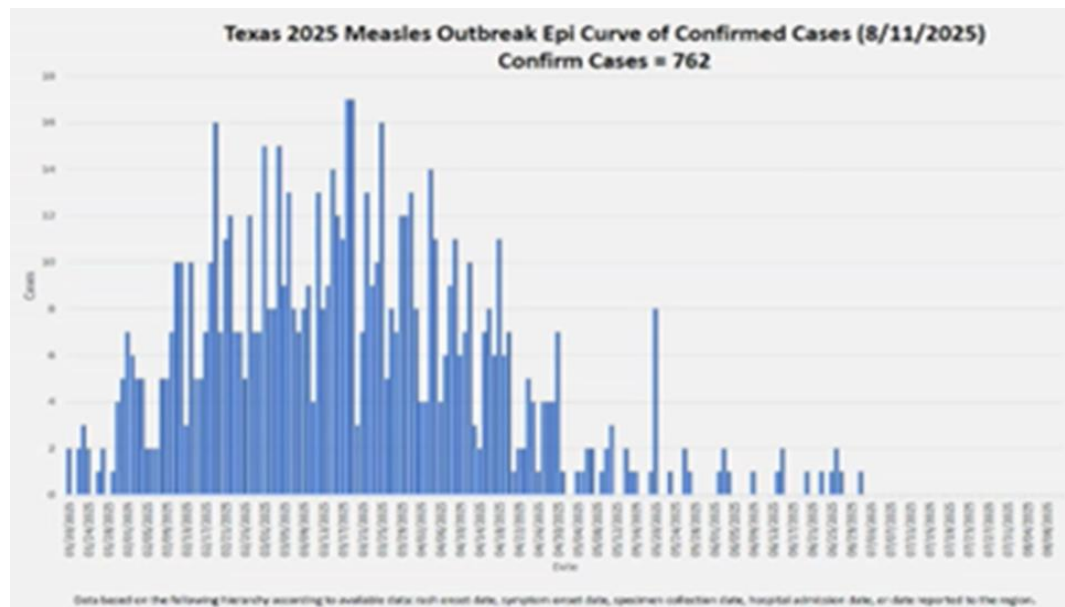
For FFY2024, total settlement before reduction was ~\$616.88 million, capped at ~\$499.19 million by CMS, resulting in a proportional reduction (80.92%) and ~\$302.14 million paid to providers.

5 new local health department/public health districts (LHD/PHD) are expected to submit their first cost reports in FFY2025, with 6 returning LHDs/PHDs and 40 returning behavioral health/community centers.

CMS-approved funding cap applies through 2028, with a potential review and adjustment of limits scheduled for September 1, 2027.

Confirm Cases = 762 (8/11/2025)

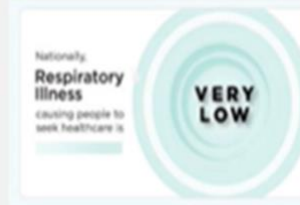

- 762 confirmed cases reported as of August 11, with cases declining significantly in recent weeks.
- Highest impact noted in school-aged children (5–17 years), with most cases among unvaccinated or unknown vaccination status individuals.
- Two deaths in Texas (a third U.S. death was in New Mexico).
- Geographic spread began in Gaines County, spreading statewide.

Respiratory Illness

National Respiratory Illness

- As of August 8, 2025, the amount of acute respiratory illness causing people to seek health care is at a very low level in the United States.
- COVID-19 activity is increasing in many areas of the country.
- Seasonal influenza activity is low, and RSV activity is very low across the country.

Percent Change from Previous Week



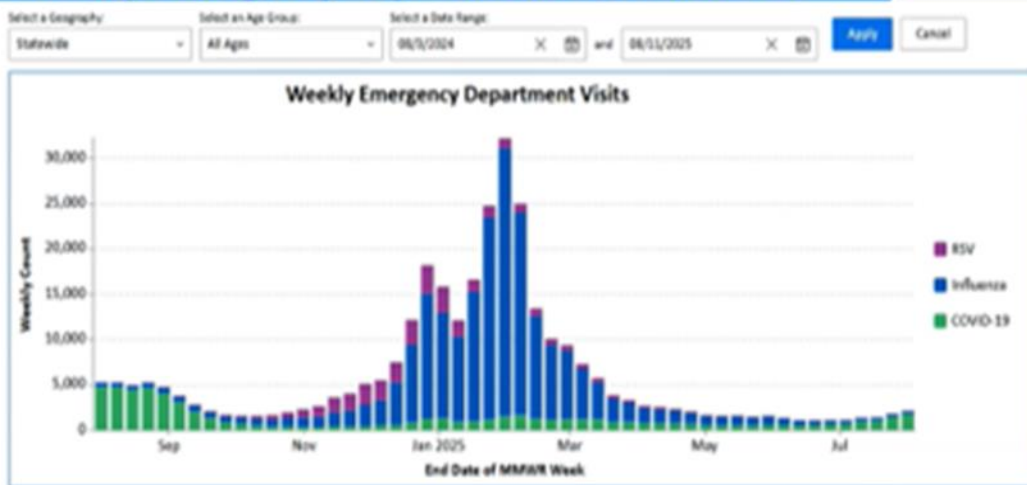

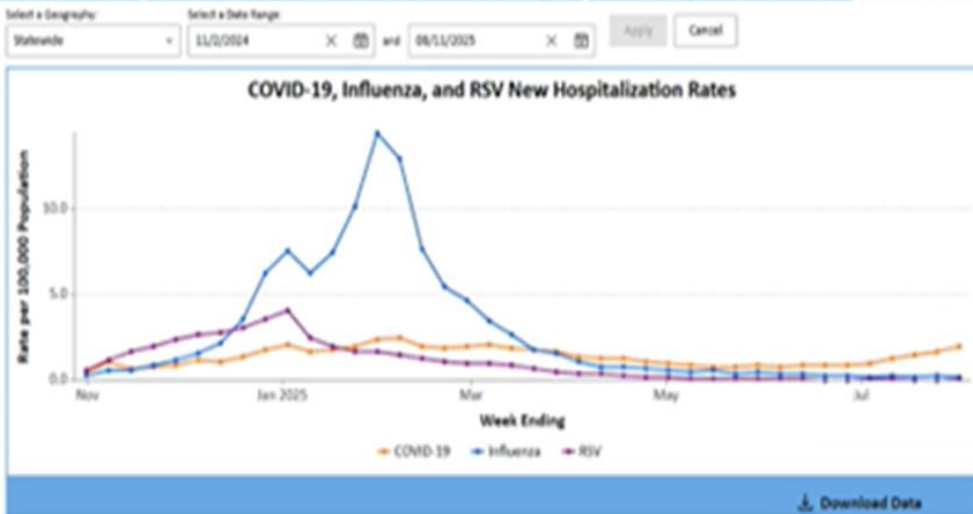

Weekly Emergency Department Visits in Texas



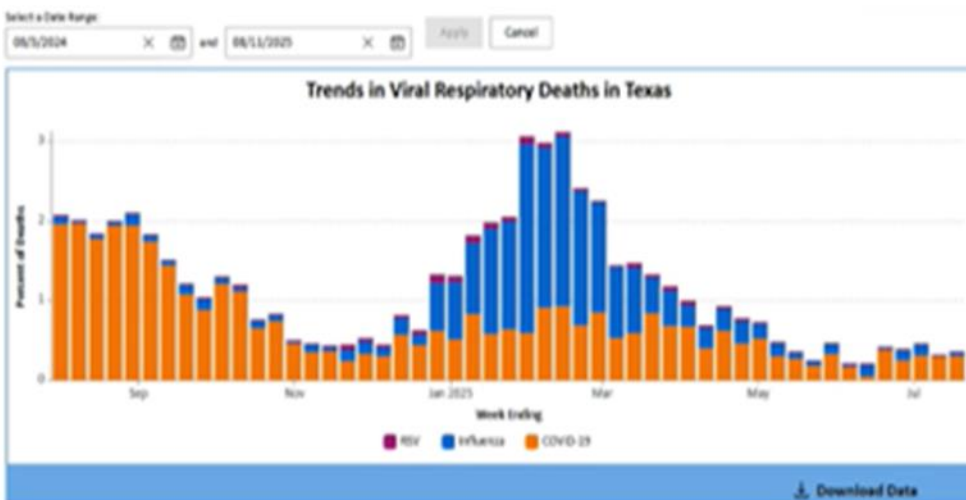

U.S. respiratory illness activity is low; COVID-19 however is increasing somewhat; influenza and RSV remain low presently.

Data sourced from CDC and state dashboards indicates hospital and syndromic surveillance systems are robust post-COVID. There has been a recent uptick seen mainly in COVID-19 cases and hospitalizations, but overall the impact is still mild. COVID-19 continues to account for the majority of respiratory-related deaths (under 8% of total deaths).

5. Data Modernization/Public Health Data Sharing Update

Access is now available to 25 users for line-level Snowflake data, 28 for summarized Tableau dashboard; 50 local health departments contracted, but only about half accessing the data.

Globalscape FTP platform used temporarily for sharing files with personally identifiable information pending Snowflake integration. The Instructions provided for access requests via IM Online single sign-on for Snowflake, Tableau, and Globalscape.

The speaker encouraged departments not yet utilizing these resources to engage and pursue access. Imelda Garcia noted a robotic process automation pilot to streamline getting local data into NEDS, emphasizing IT support and improving state-local data flows.

Immunizations Data Sharing

As of January 31, 2025, data sharing has been live for contracted local health departments. The following local health departments have approved users as of August 7, 2025:

Requesting Access to Snowflake/Tableau Roles - External Staff without IAMOnline Accounts

To access Snowflake/Tableau, you will need to use IAMOnline, the main platform for accessing HHS applications.

1. Access the [IAMOnline sign-in page](#) and click the "Request account as a non-HHS employee or register organization". Follow the steps to preregister and complete the "Partner User Registration Form".
2. Once your account is approved, an email will be sent with a link to activate your account.
3. After your IAMOnline account is activated, refer to the steps on the next slide (Requesting Access to Snowflakes Roles - External Staff with existing IAMOnline Accounts) to request Snowflake/Tableau data view access.



Need help? If you are having trouble logging into or using IAMOnline, please call the Consolidated Help Desk at 855-435-7181 (7 a.m.-7 p.m., CST, Monday through Fridays). Select option 1 for the consolidated help desk and then follow the remaining prompts. Inform the support staff of the issue you are having with IAMOnline and they will assist with resolving the issue or providing a ticket to the appropriate team.

6. Federal Funding Update

- Notice of grant awards received for HIV prevention, surveillance, and other core programs; most level-funded except for a \$1.7 million reduction in the immunizations grant (absorbed without staff cuts by reducing other activities).
- Tuberculosis funding was reduced 20%; local health department contracts cut by 5% starting September 1st, mainly due to rising medication costs and national funding changes.



- Emergency preparedness and epidemiology/lab grants received only partial awards; full amounts are pending further federal updates later in the fall.
- SNAP-Ed nutrition grants ending for nine local departments on September 29th; grant-specific details to be clarified offline as needed.
- DSHS is monitoring the federal budget for future grant announcements and maintains a priority of minimizing impact on service delivery, with advance notification to local partners.
- Discussion included the effect of new national funding formulas and the need to better communicate local impacts and staff/resource losses.

7. Appreciation for Chair Stephen Williams' Service in Texas Public

Health. The committee took time to recognize Steven Williams, retiring Director of Houston Health Department and long-serving chair of the committee since 2011.

8. Public Comment. Comments were only made regarding the retiring chair, Stephen Williams

9. Timelines, Next Steps, Announcements, and Future Meetings. The next meeting is November 8, 2025.

Issues identified during the meeting.

- Remind and assist local health departments to participate in upcoming cost report trainings for the Charity Care Program.
- Continue advocacy efforts regarding funding reductions and amplify communication about their impacts to stakeholders.
- Monitor CDC and federal budget communications for further grant award updates and prepare to manage changes with minimal service disruption.
- Follow up on SNAP-Ed grant detail requests.
